# RACING NSW REFERENCE MANUAL

Racing in NSW is not only a major sport but also as a significant generator of employment.

More than 50,000 people are employed, directly or indirectly, by the NSW thoroughbred racing industry. It is a critical factor in this state's economy.

The pinnacle of our racing year is fast becoming the Spring and the Everest Carnival, which is highlighted by The Everest, the world's richest race on turf, and The Kosciuszko which is the world's richest country race at Royal Randwick plus the Golden Eagle at Rosehill Gardens.

The Everest Carnival is held over seven weeks, with several new races established on the calendar, and it has revitalised the spring in Sydney.

The Championships continues to be the signature event in Autumn on the Sydney and NSW calendar and is now ingrained into the fabric of the city.

An initiative of Racing NSW and the Australian Turf Club introduced in 2014, The Championships represents two days of racing at one of the world's greatest million in prizemoney on offer. racecourses, Royal Randwick, with \$21.2 million in prizemoney on offer.

## The Everest

Racing NSW and the Australian Turf Club announced in February 2017 the launch of The Everest, an exciting new race with prizemoney of \$10 million.

This not only makes it the richest race in Australia but also the richest turf race in the world. The Everest was run at Royal Randwick Racecourse over 1200m for the first time on Saturday, 14 October 2017. As at its fifth renewal, prizemoney is \$15 million.

The Everest is unique to Australian racing in that the race is open to local and international buyers to purchase a slot in the race at a price of \$600,000. Twelve slots were sold in The Everest entitling the owner of the slot the opportunity to nominate a horse for the race. Importantly, the slot owner does not need to own a horse. They can negotiate with owners of horses to contest the event, with a deal being done to share the prizemoney. Under the terms of the event, slots are tradeable instruments and they can be sold, joint ventured or leased, either as a

package or as individual slots, at a time prior to a nominated race entry date. The ongoing success of The Everest has been assured, with most original slot holders continuing to support the race and new slot holders coming on board.

## The Kosciuszko

Racing NSW announced in 2018 that the world's richest country race would be held on Everest Day at Royal Randwick, with the new \$1.3 million race called The Kosciuszko and also run over 1200 metres.

The race is restricted to NSW country and ACT trained horses who will get a chance to compete on the biggest day of racing in Australia with more than \$18 million of prizemoney on offer.

Members of the public are able to buy \$5 Sweepstakes tickets through TAB venues and racecourses and 14 winning tickets are drawn. They each win an entry in The Kosciuszko and can select a NSW country trained, or one of two ACT trained, horse to race in their entry, subject to agreeing with the horse's owners as to how they will share the prizemoney for the race, with Racing NSW assisting winning ticket holders in identifying horses for selection.

## The Golden Eagle

One of the biggest challenges facing Thoroughbred racing is to remain relevant, particularly to the younger generation. Initiatives such as The Everest and The Kosciuszko were intended to attract the younger generation to racing and to enhance racing in spring in NSW, being a time when both major Australian football codes have finished.

The Golden Eagle was introduced in 2019 and is for four-year-olds, with prizemoney of \$8 million, run over 1500m at Rosehill Gardens two weeks after The Everest. The Golden Eagle capitalises on the success of The Everest and The Kosciuszko to provide Sydney's west with a feature

race well into the Spring. It is the first feature race on the Australian Racing Calendar exclusively for four-year-old racehorses and incentivises owners of star young horses to continue racing in Australia rather than retiring to stud or being sold overseas.

Of the \$8 million prizemoney for the race, 10% will be donated to charity. The connections of each runner will nominate a charity that has been accredited with Racing NSW and that charity will receive 10% of prizemoney won by their horse. Accordingly, a total of \$800,000 will go to charity with the charity nominated by the owners of the winning horse to receive over \$410,000.

The Golden Eagle is also the third leg of the new Golden Slam at Rosehill Gardens, with a \$5 million bonus offered to any horse that can win The Golden Slipper as a two-year-old, The Golden Rose as a three-year-old and The Golden Eagle as a four-year-old. As with The Everest and The Kosciuszko, it was important that the prizemoney for those races does not encroach on the traditional sources of revenue, which are used to fund existing prizemoney. Accordingly, Racing NSW identified a new bet type, Odds and Evens, to be offered by the NSW TAB with the NSW Thoroughbred Racing Industry's share of the associated revenue to be used towards the funding of prizemoney for The Golden Eagle.

## The Invitation

Among several enhancements to the spring carnival, Racing NSW established a new race for fillies and mares called The Invitation which had its inaugural running at Royal Randwick on October 23.

The Invitation carries prizemoney of \$2 million and entry is by invitation only. It is restricted to 12 elite runners and held over 1400 metres under a compressed weight and penalties scale. The inaugural winner was Icebath, trained at Hawkesbury by Brad Widdup, who was runner-up in The Golden Eagle a year earlier.

## The Hunter (Newcastle) & The Gong (Kembla Grange)

Spring racing in NSW extends beyond The Everest Spring Carnival in Sydney with Newcastle and Kembla Grange given standalone Saturday race meetings, with feature races carrying \$1 million in prizemoney.

Racing NSW and the respective race clubs set target attendances of 15,000 on each race day and while the pandemic has forced crowd number to be restricted it is evident from the 2021 editions that the local communities are embracing these race days. Racing NSW heavily supports the promotion of these events.

The Hunter is a quality handicap race held at a distance of 1300m and is increasingly attracting runners from The Everest. The Gong is also a quality handicap run over a distance of 1600m.

The Hunter race meeting at Newcastle also features the Group 3 Spring Stakes for three-year olds, transferred from the Newcastle Cup meeting held in September, and the \$300,000 The Beauford over 2300 metres while Kembla Grange's \$300,000 The Warra, over 1000 metres, had its first running in 2021 at The Gong meeting. Being the feature NSW Saturday race meetings, both The Hunter and The Gong race meetings also carry support races with a minimum of \$130,000 in prizemoney.

In a further boost for Provincial racing in NSW, 2021 saw the first running of the \$500,000 The Coast for three and four-

year-olds at Gosford in May, joining the Hawkesbury Gold Cup as a standalone Saturday fixture following the conclusion of the Sydney Autumn Carnival.

## Midway Races

In July 2021, Racing NSW implemented a new series of races called Midway Handicaps which are designed to cater for the small to medium Metropolitan and Provincial stables. Eligibility for these races is be restricted to these stables and is be based on their record of wins in the previous season.

## The Four Pillars

Further, Racing NSW also inaugurated a feature race for Midway eligible horses called the Four Pillars which is run on Golden Eagle Day over 1,500 metres under Benchmark conditions.

Carrying prizemoney of \$700,000, the Four Pillars provides an aspirational race for Midway eligible trainers.

The race was partly funded by the sale of Kosciuszko tickets. Accordingly, slot owners were drawn from the tickets sold and had the same benefits as the Kosciuszko slot owners.

## Country Racing

The \$1.3 million The Kosciuszko in the spring and the \$1.05 million Country Championships series in the autumn offer aspirational races for country participants but the country sector has also seen the largest increase of prizemoney for any sector in the past decade.

Prizemoney for TAB Highway races, which started at \$40,000 when introduced in 2015, run at metropolitan Saturday meetings for country domiciled horses only is now \$100,000.

## NSW Leads The Way

The financial future of the industry depends heavily on the certainty of a funding model that supports our race clubs.

Our success in race fields legislation and the phased introduction of taxation parity with Victorian racing industry has provided that certainty.

All wagering operators are required to pay a fee of 1.5% on turnover on NSW races, rising to 2% for race meetings which features and event worth \$150,000 or more in prizemoney.

NSW leads the way in all aspects of the thoroughbred racing industry, including the breeding and marketing of horses, the provision of first class tracks and facilities, the most stringent standards of training for industry participants, and the staging of highly competitive and entertaining race meetings the year round at both metropolitan, provincial and country venues.

I hope you find this Reference Manual a useful resource in understanding this complex industry in all its rich history and variety.

## GENERAL

The NSW Thoroughbred Racing Industry is a major decentralised industry which contributes significantly to the economy of New South Wales and is one of the State's major employers.

The industry has almost 50,000 participants providing 27,600 full-time equivalent jobs, many of which are in regional areas. At the conclusion of the 2020/21 season there were 899 trainers, 135 NSW based jockeys and 55 NSW indentured apprentice jockeys. Currently there are 3,234 stablehands and foremen registered in NSW.

At the present time the industry is made up of 129 race clubs which conduct 728 race meetings each year. Prize money distributed in 2020/21 was \$259 million. Total returns to owners was over \$291 million in the 2020/21 season.

Racing is conducted in the metropolitan area by the Australian Turf Club, which was formed in 2011 from the amalgamation of the Australian Jockey Club and the Sydney Turf Club. Racing in Sydney is conducted at Royal Randwick, Warwick Farm, Rosehill Gardens and Canterbury Park, which between them host 109 meetings each year.

In the provincial area (near metropolitan) five clubs conduct a total of 130 meetings.

Those clubs are the Newcastle Jockey Club, Hawkesbury Race Club, Wyong Race Club, Illawarra Turf Club and Gosford Race Club.

Country racing is conducted by more than 122 clubs throughout NSW. In 2020-21 there was 489 race meetings at country racecourses and 20 Picnic race meetings.

### Funding of Industry

The major part of the industry's funding is derived from payments received in terms of contractual agreements negotiated with Tabcorp as licensee for on and off course totalisator betting in NSW.

During 2020-21, TAB distributions to NSW race clubs increased to the strongest result for a number of years.

The industry also receives revenue from bookmakers operating on NSW racecourses and from race day and other activities conducted by race clubs. The passing of legislation by the NSW Government opened a new source of revenue by requiring wagering operators throughout Australia to pay a turnover fee when they use NSW thoroughbred racing information as a wagering product. Approximately \$66 million is collected annually in race field fees through the Race Fields Legislation.

## GOVERNANCE OF INDUSTRY

### Racing NSW

Racing NSW is a statutory body established under the provisions of the NSW Thoroughbred Racing Act 1996 to control and regulate the NSW Thoroughbred Racing Industry.

### Board of Racing NSW

The functions of Racing NSW are administered by a Board of eight (including a non-voting Chief Executive Officer).

Non Executive Board members are appointed by an appointments panel nominated by the Minister for Gaming and Racing. This is an interim appointments process and the legislation provides that a review is to be carried out within the next three years to determine future governance arrangements.

The day to day operations of Racing NSW are undertaken by its Chief Executive Officer and an administrative and operational staff of over 90 officers.

### Functions of Racing NSW

The principal functions of Racing NSW are:

- to control, supervise and regulate horse racing in the State,
- to ensure that all thoroughbred racing and associated wagering activities in New South Wales are conducted with the utmost probity and integrity,
- to initiate, develop and implement policies considered conducive to the promotion, strategic development and welfare of the horse racing industry in the State and the protection of the public interest as it relates to the horse racing industry

## THE FIRST TOTE

Totalizator betting was developed in New Zealand, and by 1910-11 was turning over 1.9 million pounds, from which the New Zealand Government took 80,000 pounds. The NSW Government decided bookmakers could compete with a totalizator, and by early 1917 the first automatic on-course tote was operating at Randwick. Three years later annual revenue from a 13% betting tax had reached 600,000 pounds.

# THOROUGHBRED RACING IN NSW SOME FACTS AND FIGURES

A total 728 thoroughbred race meetings were held in NSW during 2020/21.

During the 2020/21 year there were:

- 101 meetings at metropolitan tracks (Randwick, Rosehill, Warwick Farm, Canterbury) with 881 individual races and 8383 horses starting
- 130 meetings at provincial racecourses (Newcastle, Wyong, Gosford, Hawkesbury, Kembla Grange) with 971 races and 8980 starters
- 347 country TAB meeting with 2,563 races and 26,381 horses starting
- 71 Saturday TAB country meetings with 436 races and 4,395 horses starting
- 51 non-TAB country meetings offering 264 races and 2,069 starters
- 20 picnic race meetings providing 113 races and 667 horses starting

The costs of racing a horse can vary from \$30,000 to \$70,000 a year depending on the trainer's reputation, location, facilities offered, and how much time the horse spends in full work.

It is estimated that owners spend about \$459 million a year in NSW on training fees, veterinary treatment, horse transport and agistment.

In 2020/21 the total returns to owners was \$291.1 million, including bonuses paid to winning owners through the Breeder Owner Bonus Scheme being \$11.73 million, with BOBS continuing to be the most lucrative of any Australian State bonus scheme. In addition Racing NSW pays jockeys' riding fees of approximately \$12.7 million, a \$200 appearance fee for horses which don't earn prizemoney (\$910,000) and the insurance premiums for jockeys of \$4.5 million.

Currently there are 899 Trainers licensed in NSW, 68 trained from metropolitan tracks, 150 at provincial centres and 681 in the country. There were 115 bookmakers licensed in NSW. Of these 35 were metropolitan-based, 6 provincial and 74 in country NSW.

# SYDNEY SOME 200 YEARS AGO UNDER STARTER'S ORDERS

In October 2010 we celebrated the bi-centenary of Australia's first official race meeting. It was held in Sydney over three days, starting on Monday 15th October 1810, on newly designated public land which Governor Macquarie named Hyde Park.

Each day's racing consisted of three heats, run over 2 miles (3219 metres), to qualify for a final race carrying a 50 guinea purse and a trophy. The horses raced in a clockwise or right-handed direction because of the topography of the site.

Captain Ritchie's gelding Chase won the main event on the first two days, while on the Friday Mr Bevan's black gelding Scratch took the Magistrate's purse. Also on the Friday was a race over 3 miles (4828 metres), won by a horse named Gig, owned by D'arcy Wentworth and ridden by his son William Charles Wentworth. They won despite an earlier fall caused by a small dog running between the horse's legs.

Officers of the 73rd Regiment staged further meetings in Sydney in 1811, 1812 and 1813 but after they were transferred to Ceylon in 1814 racing almost disappeared for five years. Small events were held on private land at Rose Bay and Penrith. Meetings resumed at Hyde Park in 1819 but match-racing was banned two years later when Governor Macquarie declared the sport would "induce heavy drinking and gambling," bringing an end to Hyde Park's long-term role as a racing venue.

Wentworth and others founded Australia's first genuine race club, the Sydney Turf Club (although it has no connection with the future STC) in 1825, and held meetings at "Bellevue", in what is now Double Bay or Woollahra, Hyde Park and Parramatta. A bitter dispute between the club and Governor Sir Ralph Darling led to the formation in 1828 of the Australian Racing

and Jockey Club (AJRC), with Darling appointed as patron. A battle for social and racing supremacy followed, with the Sydney Turf Club finally being wound up and merged with the AJC in 1905.

By 1833 the land for what was to become Royal Randwick Racecourse had been earmarked for that purpose. The first event at Randwick was an uninspiring match race between two horses in June that year – one of the horses fell and ran off into the bush.

The Randwick course deteriorated over the following decade and became known as the "Sandy Track", eventually being closed. W.C.Wentworth made land available at Homebush, where racing continued until a much-improved Randwick was reopened in May 1860. A year later the first AJC Randwick Derby Stakes was run, the forerunner of what is now the AJC Australian Derby, with total prizemoney of 650 pounds.

In 1882, theatrical entrepreneur John Bennett and some friends formed the Rosehill Racing Club and launched the Rosehill Racecourse Company as a commercial venture. The company bought 65ha of land from the Elizabeth Farm Estate and constructed a racetrack, 10 furlongs in circumference (just over 2000m). Two grandstands were

also built. The first race meeting was held there on April 18, 1885.

By the end of 1888, Bennett sold the racecourse, which continued to operate as one of several in private hands. Canterbury Park was another, opened in 1884, and catering for standardbreds as well as thoroughbreds.

Warwick Farm was opened in March 1889 by William Forrester, who'd been using the land as a private training track. Forrester floated a private company to own and run Warwick Farm as a business, with himself as the main shareholder.

As racing grew in popularity it became obvious that the industry needed greater regulation. In 1883 under its own Act of Parliament the Australian Jockey Club drew up a new, strict set of rules. The club now had the power to register clubs and meetings, to ban horses or connections who raced at unregistered meetings, and to license bookmakers in the main enclosures.

In 1943 the State Labor Government passed legislation to establish a new


Sydney Turf Club and authorised it to conduct race meetings, and prohibiting private ownership of racetracks.. Rosehill and Canterbury Park passed into the STC's hands. The STC's first meeting was at Canterbury on 6 January 1945.

Pony club racing had been popular at Victoria Park, Kensington, Rosebery, Moorefield and Ascot, catering for horses no bigger than 14.2 hands, cast-off thoroughbreds and bush gallopers. The last race at Rosebery was in July 1940, while Kensington, now the site of the University of NSW, held its last race in December 1941

The last meeting at Victoria Park in Kensington was in February 1942 but the club continued to race at Ascot, Randwick, Rosehill and Moorefield, where it held its last meeting in July 1944. Moorefield, at Rockdale, continued to operate under lease by the STC until July 1951, after which it was sold to the Department of Education.

Ascot, at Mascot, had three tracks - grass, sand and cinders, but was eventually sold to become part of the expanding Sydney Airport.

## THE REMARKABLE 'JORROCKS'



Has there ever been a horse as tough as Jorrocks? A part Arab, foaled in 1833, Jorrocks spent his early life as a stock horse before being put to racing when he was eight years old.

In a career of 113 starts he would often walk more than 200 kilometres from one track to another, on a circuit through Goulburn, Berrima, Bathurst, Mudgee and Maitland. He carried his trainer's camping equipment and on race days would run up to 15 kilometres under heavy weights.

Jorrocks won every important race in Sydney including the Parramatta Town Plate five times. At Maitland one year he ran and was victorious on four consecutive days. Aged 15 he ran 10 times and won on each occasion.

Jorrocks was retired at 17 but two years later made a comeback, only to be beaten in the Metropolitan Handicap at Homebush.

No wonder he was known as "the iron gelding."

# TRACK CONDITIONS

All racetracks are given a rating on the day of a meeting to describe their condition. The ratings are as follows:

CATEGORY	SCALE	DESCRIPTION
FIRM	1	Dry, hard track
FIRM	2	Firm track
GOOD	3	Track with good grass coverage and cushion
GOOD	4	Track with some give in it
SOFT	5	Track with a reasonable amount of give in it
SOFT	6	Moist but not badly affected track
SOFT	7	More rain-affected track that will chop out
HEAVY	8	Rain-affected track that horses will get into
HEAVY	9	Wet track getting into a squelchy area
HEAVY	10	Heaviest category track – very wet, towards saturation

Most racecourses use a piece of equipment called a penetrometer to measure track ratings. The penetrometer measures the soil hardness whereby a weight is dropped by trigger action into the soil profile.

The depth the rod enters the soil provides the penetrometer readings which are done around the racecourse. A formula is then used to calculate an average figure for the entire course.



# BENCHMARK HANDICAPPING/ PROGRAMMING

Racing NSW is committed to providing the racing industry with:

- a Handicapping system that is transparent, fair and consistent, whilst at the same time making racing competitive.
- a programming model that is inclusive as opposed to exclusive, creating greater racing opportunities for participants, and producing interesting and exciting racing.

With those principles in mind, and after consulting extensively with the industry, Racing NSW introduced a revolutionary and innovative system known as benchmarking programming and handicapping on 1 October 2009.

Further to this, in September 2018 a dual benchmark handicapping system was established. Horses could now have two different benchmarks - One for Metropolitan/ Provincial sector and one for the Country sector

The BENCHMARK system brings together the best elements and resources of modern regulatory handicapping.

The previous Ratings (handicaps) were superseded by a published BENCHMARK that denotes the weight each horse will carry at its next start, with each BENCHMARK point equalling half a kilogram.

Ratings races were replaced by BENCHMARK races. The BENCHMARK figure published in the race program denotes the horse that will carry the minimum required topweight of 61kg, (60kg Metropolitan - Saturday), in that event. Others are weighted accordingly and allowances apply for fillies and mares, and for 3-year-olds. Handicapping: Under the BENCHMARK system each horse is assessed immediately after every start according to its performance.

If a horse runs above or below its expected performance account will be taken of that run as it compares to its overall career profile ('Form Cycle') before any adjustment to its final BENCHMARK is determined.

**Programming:** The BENCHMARK system increases options for every horse as it can be nominated for more races on each program, and then the connections can decide which race to contest after assessing its weight and competitiveness.

The BENCHMARK figure published in the race program denotes the horse that will carry the minimum required topweight of 61kg, (60kg Metropolitan - Saturday), in that event. Allowances apply for fillies and mares, and for 3-year-olds.

Horses that are assessed above the BENCHMARK value of the race are still eligible to compete, albeit with a higher weight, rather than be pushed to a higher grade as happened with the previous ratings races.

For example in a Metropolitan mid-week BENCHMARK race of 78 a horse with a BENCHMARK of 78 (with no allowances) will carry 61kg. A horse with a BENCHMARK of 84 (with no allowances) can be entered for the race and will carry 64kg i.e. 6 BENCHMARK points equals 3kg above the 61kg Benchmark weight.

Alternatively a horse with a BENCHMARK of 75 will carry 59.5kg i.e. 3 BENCHMARK points equals 1.5kg below the 61kg Benchmark weight.

A filly or mare is given a 2kg allowance. Accordingly a mare with an 78 BENCHMARK will carry 59kg.

This is better illustrated by the full example below, for a BENCHMARK 78 race to be held in March/April, which takes into account allowances for fillies, mares and 3-year-olds.

**Handicap race:** a race where horses are assigned various weights according to performance in order to equalize the winning chances of each. The allocated weight – e.g. 56 kg - is carried by the horse by totalling the jockey's weight, saddle and race gear. In NSW handicaps are allocated utilizing the Benchmark system of handicapping (see above)

**Set Weights race:** a race in which weights are apportioned to horses according to a pre-published scale either due to number of races previously won, age and sex or a combination of these

**Weight for Age race:** A set weights race in which weights are apportioned to horses solely according to their age and sex. Many of the best Group and Listed events are run at Weight for Age.

**Maiden race:** a race restricted to maiden horses that have never won a flat race at a registered meeting. Maiden races are run either under handicap or set-weight conditions

**Group and Listed races:** describes the highest quality races. Group 1 is categorized as the highest level, followed by Group 2, Group 3 and Listed.

These are also known as 'Black Type' races because reference to these races appears in sales catalogues in bold typeface. Horses with Black Type in their pedigrees are more highly regarded and carry greater value at sale or when used for breeding.

Some of the top Group 1 races conducted over the Autumn Sydney Carnival and their category types are:

**Handicap races:** Doncaster Mile 1600m for all horses and the Coolmore Classic 1500m for fillies and mares

**Set Weights races:** Golden Slipper 1200m for 2yos and ATC Australian Derby 2400m for 3yo's

**Weight for Age races :** the George Ryder Stakes 1500m and Queen Elizabeth Stakes 2000m

## COMMON RACING TERMS

**ALLOWANCES:** Weight permitted to be reduced because of the conditions of the race or because an apprentice is on a horse. Fillies and Mares also are granted an allowance when racing against males.

**APPRENTICE:** Generally a young rider who has been riding for less than 4 years. Apprentices are able to claim an allowance in races until they have ridden a total of 80 winners.

**BLACK TYPE:** A high quality Group or Listed race that attracts highly performed horses. A horse with Black Type is one that has either won or been placed in a Black Type race. These horses become valuable for breeding.

**CAST:** A "cast" horse refers to one that is stuck on the ground for some reason and an object prevents it from being able to get up. A horse that is "cast" requires assistance to get to its feet.

**CHECKED:** A horse pulled up by his jockey for an instant because it is crowded or crossed by another horse too close.

**CHESTNUT:** Varies from light, washy yellow to dark liver color, between which come red and gold shades. A chestnut never has black points, mane or tail.

**CHUTE:** An extension of the main racecourse to permit a straight run from a starting position.

**CLASSIC:** Race of traditional importance. In NSW, classics include the AJC Australian Derby for 3 year old colts and the AJC Oaks for 3 year old fillies.

**CLERK OF SCALES:** An official whose chief duty is to weigh the riders before and after a race to be sure proper weight is carried.

**CLIMBING:** A fault in a horse's stride in which, instead of reaching out, his action is abnormally high.

**CLOCKER:** One who times trackwork and races.

**COLOURS:** Racing silks, jacket worn by riders to denote the owner(s) of horse and distinguish from other horses in a race.

**COLT:** Male horse under 4 years of age.

**COOLING DOWN:** Restoring a horse, usually by walking and hosing with water, to normal temperature after becoming overheated in a race or workout.

**CORRECT WEIGHT:** Confirmation that all riders have weighed in at the correct weight and the results of the race have been verified by stewards.

**CUSHION:** Surface of track or a layer of the track. A turf track with a thick, lush grass cover is considered to have a good cushion.

**DAM:** Mother of a Thoroughbred.

**DAMSIRE (BROODMARE SIRE):** The sire of the dam.

**DEAD-HEAT:** Two or more horses finishing in an exact tie at the finishing post.

**DEAD TRACK:** Racing surface that has been slightly affected by wet weather causing some give in the track.

**DISQUALIFICATION:** A horse is disqualified from a race due to some circumstance that breached the Rules of Racing.

**DISTANCED:** Well beaten, finishing a long distance behind the winner.

**DWELT:** Tardy in commencing from the starting barriers.

**ELIGIBLE:** Qualified to start in a race, according to conditions.

**ENGAGEMENT:** A jockey's riding commitment.

**EQUIPMENT:** Whip, blinkers, etc. Gear carried by a horse or rider in a race.

**EXTENDED:** A horse extends when it gallops at its top speed.

**FALSE FAVOURITE:** A horse that is favourite when others would appear to outclass it on form.

**FARRIER:** or Blacksmith, responsible for attaching shoes on a horse.

**FAST TRACK:** A firm track with little give.

**FIELD:** The horses in a race.

**FILLY:** Female horse up to and including the age of 3.

**FOAL:** Newly born Thoroughbred, or until weaned. Male or female.

**FRONT-RUNNER:** A horse who usually leads (or tries to lead) the field.

**GAIT:** The ways in which a horse can move: walk, trot, canter, gallop, run, etc.

**GALLOP:** A type of gait, a fast canter. A horse will gallop throughout a race.

**GATE:** Starting barrier.

**GELDING:** Castrated male horse.

**GOOD TRACK:** Condition between fast and dead. An ideal racing surface.

**GRANDDAM (SECOND DAM):** Grandmother of a horse.

**GRANDSIRE:** Grandfather of a horse, sire of the horse's dam.

**GREY:** A mixture of white and black hairs.

**GROUP RACE:** Highest standard of races.

**HALF-BROTHER, HALF-SISTER:** Horses out of the same dam but by different sires.

**HALTER:** Like a bridle, but without a bit. Used in handling horses around the stable and when not being ridden.

**HAND:** One hand = 10 centimetres. Unit

used in measuring height of horses from withers to ground.

**HANDICAP:** Race for which a handicapper assigns weights to be carried after considering the race form of a horse.

**HANDICAPPER:** One who assigns weights for handicap race.

**HEAD:** A margin between horses. One horse leading another by the length of its head.

**HEAVY:** Condition of track. Severely rain affected.

**HORSE:** Broadly, any Thoroughbred regardless of sex.

**HURDLE RACE:** Contested over obstacles. A jumping race over lower fences than steeplechase races.

**IN FOAL:** Pregnant mare.

**IN THE MONEY:** Finishing first, second or third.

**INFIELD:** Area within the inner rail of the racetrack.

**IMPOST:** Weight carried or assigned.

**IRONS:** Stirrups.

**JOCKEY'S AGENT:** A licensed person empowered to obtain rides on behalf of a jockey.

**JOCKEY FEE:** Sum paid to a rider.

**JOG:** Slow, easy gait.

**JUDGES:** Officials who determine the order in which horses reach the finish line.

**JUMPER:** Steeplechase or hurdle horse.

**JUVENILE:** Two-year-old horse.

**LEAD:** Strap attached to halter to lead a horse.

**LEAD (or LEAD BAG):** Weights carried to make up the difference when a rider weighs less than the weight a horse is assigned to carry.

**LENGTH:** Length of a horse from nose to tail, about 2.4 metres. Also distance between horses in a race.

**LISTED RACE:** A race just below a Group race in quality.

**LUG (in or out):** Action of a tiring horse, shifting in or out.

**MAIDEN:** A horse which has not won a race.

**MAIDEN RACE:** A race for non-winners.

**MAKE A RUN:** Charge by a horse in a race.

**MARE:** Female horse 4 years old or older.

**MUDLARK:** Horse which races well on wet tracks.

**NEAR SIDE:** Left side of a horse, side on which he is mounted.

**NECK:** Unit of measurement, about the length of a horse's neck; a quarter of a length.

**NOSE:** Smallest advantage a horse can win by.

**PADDOCK:** Area where horses are saddled and paraded before race.

**PENALTIES:** Extra weight a horse must carry, especially in a handicap.

**PHOTO FINISH:** A result so close it is necessary to use a finish line camera to determine order of finish.

**PLACE:** First, second or third position at finish.

**PLATES:** Shoes horses wear in races. Racing plates.

**POCKET:** Boxed in, shut off. Running in a position with horses in front and alongside.

**PROP:** Refusing to break with field from gate. Standing flat-footed. Also, when a horse suddenly stops running at full speed by extending his forefeet as "brakes."

**RIDDEN OUT:** Refers to a horse that wins under vigorous riding.

**RIDE SHORT:** Jockey uses short stirrup leathers.

**ROAN:** Mixture of white and red (or brown) hairs.

**ROARING:** Deep, prolonged cough, generally when a horse is galloping.

**ROGUE:** Ill-tempered horse.

**SADDLE CLOTH:** Cloth under the saddle on which horse's number is displayed.

**SAVAGE:** To bite another horse or a person.

**SCHOOLING:** A training technique used to vary a horse's training schedule by having it jump small hurdles.

**SCRATCH:** To be taken out of a race.

**SECOND DAM:** Grandmother; grand dam.

**SESAMOID:** Sesamoid bones are located at the back of the fetlock, the joint formed by the pastern bone and the cannon bone.

**SILKS:** Jacket and cap worn by riders which designate owner of the horse.

**SIRE:** Father of a horse.

**SLOW:** Footing that is rain affected, between dead and heavy.

**SPIT THE BIT:** When a horse quits running against the bit, usually because of fatigue.

**STALLION:** Entire Male horse.

**STAR:** Small patch of white hair on a horse's forehead.

**STARTING GATE:** Mechanical device having partitions (stalls) for horses in which they are confined until the starter releases the gates in front to begin the race.

**STAYER:** A horse which can race long distances.

**STEADIED:** A horse being taken in hand by his rider, usually because of being in close to another horse in a race.

**STEPS UP:** A horse moving up in class to meet better opposition.

**STEWARDS:** Officials of the meeting responsible for enforcing the rules.

**STEEPLECHASE:** A jumping race over high obstacles.

**STOCKINGS:** White legs below the knees.

**STRIDE:** Manner of going. Also distance covered after each foot has touched the ground once.

**STUD:** Breeding farm.

**STUD BOOK:** Registry and genealogical record of the breeding of Thoroughbreds.

**SUSPEND** (or **SUSPENSION**): Punishment for infringement of the rules.

**TOPWEIGHT:** Highest weight assigned or carried in a race.

**TRACK BIAS:** A racing surface that favours a particular running style or position; horses that run on the lead or on the rail.

**TRACK RECORD:** Fastest time at various distances recorded at a particular track.

**TRIAL:** A trial is used to train horses to race. In NSW horses must trial before they are eligible to race.

**UNTRIED:** Not raced or trialled.

**WALKOVER:** Race in which scratchings leave only one starter who merely gallops a required distance. A formal gesture required by rules of racing.

**WARMING UP:** A canter or gallop by a horse on the way to starting barriers.

**WEANLING:** A foal that is less than 1-year-old that has been separated from its dam.

**WEIGHT-FOR-AGE:** Fixed scale of weights to be carried by horses according to age, sex, distance of race and season of year.

**WHIP:** A padded instrument, with which a rider uses for control and to encourage speed.

**WITHERS:** The highest point of a horse's shoulder.

**WORK:** To exercise a horse. A workout.

**YEARLING:** A horse aged one.

## GEAR DEFINITIONS

**Bar Plate:** A therapeutic racing plate that has a cross bar placed along its back to prevent horse placing pressure on sole of the hoof. The application of bar plates suggests the farrier is protecting a bruised hoof, heel or quarter cracking at the base of the heel.

**Barrier Blanket:** A blanket used on horses with a fear of the starting barriers and designed to prevent the horse's

flanks from touching the sides of the stalls. The barrier blanket remains on the horse until it jumps from the barrier stalls. The barrier blanket gets tied to the back of the stalls when the horse is loaded and remains in the barrier as the horse jumps.

**Blinkers:** Can be either a one eyed blinker (near side or off side) or a complete set of blinkers covering both eyes. Blinkers are used on horses that are wayward or lose concentration, especially when other horses are around them. The idea of a set of blinkers is as the name implies to focus the horse's attention on what is happening directly in front of it and ignore what is happening behind it. From a betting perspective horses carrying blinkers for the first time can sometimes find it assists them to perform to their maximum ability. If a horse is to wear blinkers with a Nose Roll it would be required to barrier trial to the satisfaction of the Stewards prior to racing with that combination of gear.

**Crossover Nose Band:** A device for horses that open their mouths in races and pull or overrace. A crossover nose band has 2 straps that cross over the front of the nose to form an X. The bottom strap does up under the chin: the other one is half way down the nasal bone.

**Lugging Bit:** For horses that "hang" or "lug". Horses may "lug" or "hang" either inwards or outwards especially rounding turns and when being placed under pressure. There are many forms of lugging bits including a ring bit which would be the most commonly used bit in racing in Australia.

**Norton Bit:** Is used for horses that pull hard and overrace giving the jockey or rider more control over their mounts. The Norton bit has the normal 2 rings (one on each side of the mouth) with 2 mouthpieces and a nose strap. The reins pull on the bits causing a double scissor

action within the mouth which pulls on the top of the mouth.

**Nose Roll:** A sheepskin roll placed across the nose on horses that race with their heads too high. It restricts vision forcing the horse to lower its head. Horses racing with their heads high are harder for jockeys to relax and control. If a horse is to wear a nose roll with blinkers/ pacifiers it would be required to barrier trial to the satisfaction of the Stewards.

**Pacifiers:** A mesh invention put over a horse's eyes used to help excitable horses relax. The closely knit mesh ensures the horse has to concentrate just to be able to see.

**Tail Chain:** Applied to male horses to eliminate a gelding or stallion from drawing in air through their anal cavity whilst racing which will lead to the possibility of stomach pain and sub-standard race track performance.

**Tongue Tie:** Ties a horse's tongue to eliminate the possibility of a horse swallowing its tongue and choking down, or playing with its tongue throughout a race which can take its concentration away from racing. A tongue tie also will prevent a horse from getting its tongue over the bit which could affect the control a jockey would have on their mounts and also may result in a horse cutting off its airway. A tongue tie may be made from stocking, a leather strap or a large rubber band, with certain width and thickness guidelines established by racing authorities.

**Visors:** Blinkers with a hole cut out of the back of each blinker cup which results in a horse vision being less restricted than a set of blinkers. Visors allow a horse to see other horses beside it, at the same time assisting the horse's concentration and focus.

**Whip:** All whips used by Jockeys in races must be of a padded design approved by the Australian Racing Board. Whips are used as a means of control for jockeys and encouragement to horses. There are strict rules in place limiting the number of times a jockey can use the whip and also requiring a jockey not to use a whip on a horse out of contention.

**Winkers:** A sheepskin device which attaches to the cheek straps of the bridle once again to help the horse focus its vision to the front, but winkers allow more side vision than blinkers.

## BETTING TERMS

In NSW betting (wagering) is conducted by Tabcorp, on course betting exchanges and corporate bookmakers

Bookmakers are persons licensed by Racing NSW to offer betting services at NSW race meetings and Tabcorp is licensed to conduct totalizator betting at racecourses and off-course through its various retail outlets (cash agencies, telephone and internet betting). Corporate Bookmakers are licensed off course wagering operators who operate out of various jurisdictions and offer betting services online.

Betting on horse racing usually takes one of the following forms:

- Fixed Odds Betting
- Totalizator Betting

### Fixed Odds Betting

Fixed Odds betting is offered by on-course bookmakers, the NSW TAB and corporate Bookmakers. With fixed odds betting the operator offers odds against the chances of each runner winning or running a place in a race. Customers then place a bet on that runner at the odds offered at that time, and the stake of the bet is multiplied by the odds on offer. If successful, the punter receives the resultant amount plus the original stake.

Fixed Odds betting usually takes the following forms:

- Win betting which requires the punter to successfully select the runner which wins the race.
- Place betting which requires the punter to select a starter which runs in the first three placings.
- Each-way betting allows a punter to nominate a horse to either win or run a place in the race, effectively making two individual bets. The operator normally provides one quarter of the win odds for the place portion of the bet. If the punter's selection wins the race he will be paid on both portions of the bet and if the horse runs second or third he will receive the place portion only. Usually there must be eight runners or more in a race to offer each way betting.

## Totalizator Betting

A totalizator is a system used to enable people to invest money on events or contingencies into a common pool. The money left after the deduction of commission to the pool owner (usually the TAB) is then divided and distributed as dividends among those who successfully predict the winning outcome. The most common forms of totalizator betting are:

**Win:** The most popular bet you can have. Simply pick the runner that you think will finish 1st in a race.

**Place:** Pick a runner in a race and if your runner finishes 1st, 2nd or 3rd you will collect your place dividend. (Under normal circumstances a 3rd place dividend is only paid in races with eight or more runners).

### An Each Way bet (Win/Place):

Combines the Win and Place bets. If your runner wins, you will collect both a Win and Place dividend or if your runner finishes 2nd or 3rd you will collect the Place dividend only.



**Quinella:** To win the Quinella you are required to correctly select the two runners that finish 1st and 2nd in a race, in any order.

**Exacta:** An Exacta requires you to correctly select the two runners that finish 1st and 2nd in a race in the correct order.

**Duet:** The Duet requires you to correctly select 2 of the 3 placegetters in any order and is only available on races that have eight or more runners. The Duet will pay three dividends for the following combinations: 1st and 2nd, 1st and 3rd, and 2nd and 3rd.

**Trifecta:** The Trifecta requires you to select the runners that will finish 1st, 2nd and 3rd in a race, in the correct finishing order. A 'box' trifecta means your selections can finish in any order and you still win.

**First 4:** The First 4 requires you to select the 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th placegetters in the correct finishing order.

**Double:** The Double requires you to correctly select the winners of any two nominated races at the one race meeting e.g. a 'running double' Race 2 winner and Race 3 winner. The 'daily double' is usually on the 3rd to last and last race on the day.

**Quadrella:** A Quadrella or 'Quaddie', requires you to pick four winners from four races nominated by TAB at the one meeting. The Quaddie for each race meeting are marked in form guides and at [tab.com.au](http://tab.com.au) and are usually the last four races of the day.

**Big 6:** A BIG 6 requires you to pick six winners from six races nominated by TAB. The races that make up a BIG6 may be at the same race meeting or at different race meetings. There is at least one BIG6 available every week. Available BIG6s are indicated in the racing form guides and at [tab.com.au](http://tab.com.au).

## Racing Terminology - Betting

**All Up:** A more complex bet which involves 'parlaying' or re-investing your winnings from one race into one or more other races. To parlay means to create a single bet that links together two or more individual bets and is dependent on all of those bets winning together.

**Flexi Betting:** Flexi Betting is an innovative way to bet with the TAB. It allows you to include as many selections as you like for whatever investment you wish to make. The TAB calculates the percentage of the bet for you and if you win, you collect the percentage of the dividend that you have paid for. Flexi bets are available across Trifectas, First Fours, Quaddies, BIG 6, Quinellas, Exactas, Duets and Doubles.


**Betting Exchanges:** Offer a form of betting where the operator accepts bets from punters on the predicted outcome of a certain contingency (e.g a horse winning a race) and matches them with bets placed by other punters who select the opposite outcome. In effect the bet is between two individual punters and the operator does not become party to the bet. The operator then extracts a commission from the winnings of the successful punter.

Betfair, located and licensed in Tasmania, is the only betting exchange in Australia.

### The Australian Turf Club

The Australian Turf Club (ATC) is Sydney's premier metropolitan thoroughbred racing club and hosts 110 race meetings each year at its four racetracks. The ATC was born from the unification of the Australian Jockey Club and Sydney Turf Club in February 2011, and boasts the world's most significant racing events, The Longines Golden Slipper and The Golden Eagle at Rosehill Gardens along with The Everest and The Championships at Royal Randwick.

Construction of the new \$46.6 million WINX Stand, a fully funded ATC project with Racing NSW, at Royal Randwick was completed in late 2021 and officially opened on December 2, setting a new benchmark for spectator facilities and meetings and events.

Plans for night racing at Royal Randwick passed an important milestone with Randwick City Council endorsing ATC plans to install lights, which included extensive work to reduce light spillage and disruption around the local streets.

The ATC has more than 14,821 members.

### Royal Randwick

Established in 1842, the internationally renowned Royal Randwick is one of Australia's oldest horse racing venues. More than 700 horses are trained at Royal Randwick, home to a number of the nation's leading trainers, including Australia's first lady of racing, Gai Waterhouse and the family team of Peter and Paul Snowden. The legendary Bart Cummings also trained at Randwick. In September 2013, the ATC completed a \$150 million investment in the Queen Elizabeth II Grandstand, Theatre Of The Horse and surrounding racecourse precinct. The redevelopment includes a five-storey grandstand and the Longines Owners and Trainers Pavilion.

Away from race days on the track, Royal Randwick offers unique indoor and outdoor venues conventions and events. The racecourse provides a canvas for cultural festivals, concerts and weddings, through to conferences, exhibitions and corporate family days.

The ATC in partnership with the Keytsone Group established The Stables on Level 4 of the QEII Grandstand, a 7-day a week dining and business networking space, hailed as one of Sydney's finest venues, and unique to any racecourse in the world. There are a number of feature race days on Royal Randwick's racing calendar highlighted by The Everest, which is the world's richest turf race, in the spring. The Championships, showcasing 12 'Championships Races', are held on the first two Saturdays in April and feature traditional Group 1 races like the Australian Derby, Doncaster Mile, Sydney Cup and its signature race the Queen Elizabeth Stakes. In addition to the are 20 black type races the Country and Provincial Championships are popular features, and \$20 million in prizemoney is on offer.

### Warwick Farm

Warwick Farm is a 'country style' track in the city, with a wonderful picnic atmosphere and spacious lawn areas that are particularly popular with families as well as regular racegoers.

Predominantly used for midweek racing, Warwick Farm is also a major training centre with more than 700 horses in work and a highly regarded Pro-Ride all-weather training track.

It is home to world racing powerhouse Godolphin led by James Cummings, along with leading trainers Joe Pride, Bjorn Baker, Gary Portelli and Annabel Neasham.

## Rosehill Gardens

Rosehill Gardens is the flagship racecourse of Western Sydney. Established in 1943, this world-class facility has been home to the Longines Golden Slipper – the world’s richest race for two-year-old thoroughbreds at \$5 million – since the race’s inception in 1957.

Rosehill Gardens is also home to many of Sydney’s most popular race days; headlined by the Golden Slipper Festival in the autumn, and the Golden Rose and Golden Eagle meetings in the spring.

The racecourse features a modern stable complex housing over 400 thoroughbreds, overseen by Sydney’s most successful stables, including the record-breaking, multiple premiership winning trainer Chris Waller, along with “Team Hawkes” which is father John and sons Michael and Wayne, along with Gerald Ryan and David Payne. Rosehill Gardens continues to grow an extensive and diverse event portfolio through the Rosehill Gardens Event Centre and Grand Pavilion, which have quickly become one of Australia’s premier

destinations for gala dinners, corporate conferences, special events and exhibitions.

The course also plays host to some of the State’s favourite events including the NSW Caravan, Camping, 4WD & Holiday Supershow.

## Canterbury Park

Renowned as the most intimate racetrack in Sydney, with racegoers able to get closer to the action at Canterbury than the other metropolitan courses. Canterbury is the only racecourse currently equipped to hold night racing meetings in NSW, with night racing occurring through the summer months.

The concept has experienced a boom in recent years with the promotion of a family atmosphere including food trucks, children’s events and jockey meet and greets.

The venue is one of the workhorses of the state and is considered to have one of the best racing surfaces in the country.

## The History of the Golden Slipper

The first Golden Slipper Stakes in 1957 was won by Todman, ridden by Neville Sellwood. Todman defeated his 10 rivals by 8 lengths.

In 1958 the 25/1 outsider Skyline was victorious, while the hot favourite Fine And Dandy won in 1959. Only 5 starters contested the 1960 Golden Slipper, which went to Skyline's brother Sky High, who defeated the brilliant filly Wenona Girl by 1 ½ lengths.

Magic Night became the first filly to win the race when she defeated Young Brolga and the top New Zealand colt Commanding in 1961. Magic Night's win made it five in a row for her sire, the imported stallion Star Kingdom. The 1962 winner Birthday Card was one of nine fillies contesting the Golden Slipper that year, and her time of 1-11.4 equalled Todman's race record. Heavy rain in 1963 forced the STC to postpone the race until the following Wednesday but the track was still very wet. The South Australian colt Pago Pago and the Sydney gelding Time And Tide shared favouritism at 2/1 but Pago Pago was a clear winner. The favourite Eskimo Prince, sired by the first Slipper winner, Todman, was a convincing winner in 1964. A field of 13 lined up in 1965 but none could match the brilliance of the filly Reisling, who led all the way to set a new race record of 1-11.1. In 1966 the photo-finish camera was used for the first time to decide the Slipper winner. The Bart Cummings-trained filly Storm Queen won by a head from Academy Star, with Very Merry three-quarters of a length away third. In 1967 there were 19 starters from 4 states. The race went to 40/1 outsider Sweet Embrace, a daughter of Todman and the first maiden to win the Slipper. The previously unbeaten colt Biscay was defeated by Royal Parma in 1968, but Victorians had their revenge the following year when Vain demolished a star studded field. The 1970 winner Baguette gave veteran jockey George Moore his first Golden Slipper win, and he backed up with another victory the following year, on Fairy Walk.

In 1972 John's Hope equalled the race record, giving jockey Kevin Langby his first success. A sensational three-horse fall which included the hot favourite Imagele marred the 1973 race. It was won by the Victorian gelding Tontonan, giving Roy Higgins and Bart Cummings their second Slipper win. Tommy Smith and Kevin Langby were successful in 1974 and 1975 with the fillies Hartshill and Toy Show, giving Smith 4 winners. Bart Cummings bounced back in 1976 when the filly Vivarchi led all the way to equal the metric race

record of 1-11.7. The champion Newcastle colt Luskin Star put in one of the greatest Slipper performances when he won the 1977 event by 7 lengths and took 1.7 seconds off the race record. Another champion scored in 1978 when the Victorian gelding Manikato repeated his victory in the Blue Diamond Stakes.

The photo-finish camera was needed again in 1979 when the Cummings-trained filly Century Miss stormed home to defeat Dawn Command. At 18, apprentice Wayne Harris became the youngest rider to win the Golden Slipper. Fillies took the first three places in 1980, when Dark Eclipse defeated Joy and Baglaga Miss. Victorian colt Full On Aces won on a slow track in 1981. A year later Rosehill trainer Jack Denham saddled the first two placegetters, Marscay and Vaindarra. Marscay's rider Ron Quinton won again in 1982, guiding Sir Dapper to victory over Been There and Love A Show. In 1984 the 1969 Slipper winner Vain became the first stallion since Star Kingdom to produce successive Golden Slipper winners, when 18-year-old apprentice Darren Beadman won on Inspired.

Leading South Australian trainer Colin Hayes had his first Slipper winner when Rory's Jester took the 1985 event from the previously unbeaten filly Speed Check. Tommy Smith created history in 1986 as the first person to breed, own and train a Slipper winner, when Bounding Away gave him his 5th victory and equaled the race record. The colt Marauding gave Ron Quinton his fourth Slipper victory in 1987. Until 1988 no horse had won the Slipper from outside barrier 14, but the Smith-trained Star Watch showed blistering speed to score comfortably by ¾ length. The Melbourne filly Courtza, trained by Ross McDonald and ridden by Shane Dye, won as a 7/2 favourite in 1989.

In 1990 on a heavy track 6 colts and 10 fillies lined up, with honours going to Canny Lad, ridden by Shane Dye and trained by Rick Hore-Lacy. Records fell in 1991 when Dye rode the Clarry Connors-trained Tierce to victory in a record time of 1-09.3. It was Dye and Connors again in 1992 when the filly Burst defeated favourite Clan O'Sullivan. 1993 saw the Slipper's first winner come from the extreme outside barrier. Bint Marscay not only blitzed her rivals to defeat Justice Prevails and Sports Works but did it in a record time of 1-08.88. It was trainer Lee Freedman's first Slipper success and jockey Mick Dittman's third. Freedman won again in 1994 with Danzero, which had to withstand protests from two other runners.

## The History of the Golden Slipper

Flying Spur defeated Octagonal by half a neck in 1995, with the filly Millrich third ahead of favourites Strategic and Our Maizcay. The 1996 winner, the filly Merlene, gave Freedman an unprecedented fourth consecutive winner, and provided stallion Danehill with his third in a row. Guineas defeated Encounter by a nose in 1997, giving John Hawkes his first training victory. 1998 victor Prowl was sired by Marauding, the eighth time a winner had been sired by a previous winner. The 1999 Slipper was marked by the dramatic late scratching of favourite Redoute's Choice because of travel sickness after arriving from Melbourne only the day before. Catbird then became the first Black Opal winner to go on to success in the Golden Slipper.

Belle Du Jour overcame a shocking start to snatch a last stride win in 2000, giving trainer Clarry Conners his fourth victory in 10 years. Gai Waterhouse created history in 2001 by starting five horses and filling the first three places with Ha Ha, Excellerator and Red Hannigan. Queensland claimed its first Golden Slipper in 2002 when Calaway Gal became the first late entry to succeed since Pago Pago 39 years earlier, defeating Victory Vein and Choisir. Fillies filled all three placings in 2003 when Polar Success defeated How Funny and Hasna. Dance Hero led all the way in 2004, emulating his sire Danzero 10 years earlier. Dance Hero was the first Magic Millions winner to take the Golden Slipper. Newcastle provided its second winner in 2005 when Stratum beat fillies Fashions Afield and Media. Stratum was to become the sire of a Slipper winner himself, Crystal Lily five years later.

2006 was the Golden Slipper's 50th anniversary and David Hayes won the event for the first time with Miss Finland ahead of Queenslander Pure Energy and another Hayes runner in Churchill Downs. Forensics, a daughter of 1995 winner Flying Spur, was victorious from barrier 1 in 2007, when prizemoney reached a record \$3.5m for the first time. The unbeaten colt Sebring remained undefeated when he took the 2008 Slipper, giving trainer Gai Waterhouse her third success. Sebring was sired by the US-bred stallion More Than Ready, who also sired 2009 winner Phelan Ready. Trained by the Queensland father and son team of Bruce and Jason McLachlan, Phelan Ready became only the second horse to win the Magic Millions/Golden Slipper double. In 2010 victory went to a late entry, the Victorian filly Crystal Lily, trained by Matthew Ellerton and Simon Zahra. Crystal Lily started from barrier 1 but finished the race up against the outside fence after drifting wide in the run home. Clarry Conners trained Decision Time to run second and Gai Waterhouse the third placegetter More Strawberries.

In 2011 favourite Sepoy became the first horse since Courtza in 1989 to complete the Blue Diamond-Golden Slipper double, defeating the fillies Mosheen and Elite Falls. Second favourite Smart Missile and Fast And Sexy were both withdrawn after becoming fractious in the barrier stalls. The 2012 edition was won by the super colt Pierro, who went on to win the 'triple crown' of 2YO races over the BMW Sydney Carnival (the Golden Slipper, the Sires Produce and the Champagne Stakes). In 2013 it was Gai Waterhouse again with Overreach providing her a fifth win in the race, just one behind her father Tommy Smith. 2014 proved one for the ladies when Mossfun ran a gutsy race beating home hot favourite Earthquake with the first 7 over the line all fillies. 2015 saw Vancouver and English provide the quinella for Gai Waterhouse. 2016 proved to be a special day for father and son team Peter & Paul Snowden with Capitalist winning by 1/2 head. 2017 saw She Will Reign win for Gary Portelli. 2018 was won by Estijaab for the Michael, Wayne and John Hawkes partnership. In 2019 Kiamich saluted for James Cummings. In 2020 Farnan won for the partnership of Gai Waterhouse and Adrian Bott. 2021 saw the colt, Stay Inside, salute for the Richard and Michael Freedman partnership.

Of the 61 Golden Slipper winners 37 have been won by colts and geldings, 28 by fillies.

## THE EVEREST

The fifth running of The Everest was held at Royal Randwick on 16 October 2021 and the event continued to excite patrons and the off-course audience alike - including a global audience watching the race through Sky Racing, and both TVG and Fox Sports in North America. And for the first time in 2021, Hong Kong punters were able to watch and bet on the race.

While record crowds have attended each Everest meeting, as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic crowd numbers have been restricted for the past two years under limitations set by the NSW Government but tickets sold out almost immediately.

Racing NSW established the race to target the under 35 demographic and they have embraced it. This has been one of the major reasons for the race's ongoing success.

It's an event that attracts discussion and debate all year round, with trainers and slot holders always on the lookout for a potential 'Everest horse'.

Some horses are secured months in advance to run in the race but slot holders can leave it as late as the Tuesday before the race to declare a runner.

The 2021 edition was won by the Chris Waller trained Nature Strip, having his third attempt at the race, ridden by James McDonald in a thrilling finish over Masked Crusader and Eduardo. Nature Strip was the

first horse confirmed as a runner in 2021 and raced in the Chris Waller Racing slot.

In accordance with the Board's earlier decision and the commitment of Racing NSW and the Australian Turf Club to reinvest any incremental profits from The Everest back into prizemoney which currently stands at \$15 million. This level of prizemoney is befitting Australia's richest race and the World's richest race on turf. It's the modern race that everyone wants to win.

## THE KOSCIUSZKO

The world's richest country race has quickly become the most talked about event on the country racing calendar. Worth \$1.3 million, The Kosciuszko is run over 1200 metres on Everest Day at Royal Randwick and the 14 horse field is selected by members of the public, by punters, who have purchased tickets for \$5 in the Kosciuszko Sweepstakes.

If you're lucky enough to select the horse that wins the windfall can be life changing. Since its inception owners and trainers have been looking for the right horse to target the race but performance and reputation isn't enough to secure one of the slots. It comes down to the discretion of the slot winner who as part of the agreement to select a horse must receive at least 40 per cent of the prizemoney won.

Due to this aspect of the race trainers regularly look to promote their horses on radio or social media to attract the attention of the slot winners, which adds valuable promotion to country racing in all corners of the state.

The inaugural running was won by Belflyer, an outsider trained at Grafton by John Shelton, and he was one of the last horses selected for the race. Winners have come from a variety of areas with Canberra, Scone and Shoalhaven also producing Kosciuszko heroes.

## THE GOLDEN EAGLE

There had long been a missing link on the Australian racing calendar and in 2019 it was filled when Racing NSW introduced The Golden Eagle.

It's a feature race especially for four-year-olds, run in the spring at Rosehill Gardens over 1500 metres, and has quickly become a major focus for owners and trainers Australia wide and internationally.

For \$8 million you'd expect nothing less. But the Golden Eagle isn't just a rich horse race, it's an opportunity for charities to receive a sizeable donation as 10 per cent of the total prizemoney goes to the charity selected by the owners of each runner. In 2022 the total amount donated will be \$800,000.

When the Golden Eagle was announced it formed the third leg of a \$5 million challenge for horse, trainer and owner – should they wish to attempt it.

That's for the horse that can win the \$5 million Longines Golden Slipper as a two-year-old, return in the spring to claim the

\$1 million Golden Rose at three then back up 12 months later and take out the \$8 million Golden Eagle.

It's called the Golden Slam and it would be \$5 million well earned.

Such has been the impact of the race, each winner to date has been a Group 1 winner prior to contesting the Golden Eagle. Both inaugural winner Kolding and 2020 champ Colette have since gone on to win at Group 1 level, confirming its status. I'm Thunderstruck, the first interstate trained winner of the Golden Eagle, took out the 2021 edition with a dazzling burst to run down Count De Rupee who would go on three weeks later to win the \$1 million The Gong at Kembla Grange.

# THE GRAND FINALS OF AUSTRALIAN RACING

## THE CHAMPIONSHIPS - DAY 1 THE CHAMPIONSHIPS - DAY 2

### 1. The Star Doncaster Mile – \$3m

The world's richest mile race and long acknowledged as Australia's mile championship. In 2021 total prizemoney was \$A3 million plus a miniature replica of the perpetual trophy from 1858 donated by the Packer family.

### 2. TJ Smith Stakes – \$2.5m

This race has quickly established itself as the sprinting championship of Australia. In 2014 the prizemoney increased to \$A2.5 million, making it the world's richest open sprint race. Black Caviar won the race twice, first in 2011 in what many regard as her greatest victory and then in 2013, her 25th and final victory.

### 3. Australian Derby – \$2m

Australia's premier race for staying 3YOs. First run in 1861, it has been run in the autumn since 1979. With \$A2 million in prizemoney in 2014 it is Australia's richest Derby.

### 4. Inglis Sires – \$1m

Forms the second leg of the 2YO triple crown. It is Royal Randwick's 2YO championship race, won most recently by Guelph in 2013 and Pierro in 2012.

### 5. The Newhaven Park Country Championships Final

### 1. Longines Queen Elizabeth Stakes – \$4m

A race steeped in history, the increase in prizemoney to \$A4 million makes the Queen Elizabeth the world's richest 2000m turf race.

### 2. Schweppes Sydney Cup – \$2m

An increase in prizemoney to \$A2 million sees the Sydney Cup become the autumn championship in the 2 mile handicap category.

### 3. Australian Oaks – \$1m

The premier staying test for 3YO fillies in Australia. Run since 1885 it now becomes one of the world's richest Oaks.

### 4. Coolmore Legacy Stakes – \$1m

The fillies & mares mile championship. Run at 1500m since 1972 at Rosehill, the race moved to Royal Randwick over 1600m in 2014 with \$A1 million on offer.

### 5. Arrowfield 3YO Sprint – \$1m

Moved from February, the race becomes the autumn sprint championship for 3YOs.

### 6. Percy Sykes Stakes – \$1m

Originally named the Keith Mackay Stakes, the boost in prizemoney makes the race the Australian championship for 2YO fillies.

### 7. Polytrack Provincial Championships Final

### 2021 Country & Provincial Championships

Launched in 2015, the inaugural Country and Provincial Championships proved a resounding success for the racing industry and generated unprecedented interest and coverage.

An initiative of Racing NSW and supported by the Government of NSW, the series was created to support and promote NSW racing in country and provincial areas, ensuring that horses from across the state are part of The Championships in Sydney in the autumn.

The Country Championships consists of a series of seven qualifying races, each held at a club representing one racing region in NSW. Each race will be worth \$150,000 in prizemoney, and will be contested by eligible horses that must be under the care of a country trainer in that region. An eighth 'Wild Card' race, worth \$50,000, will be held to provide one more opportunity for horses to qualify for the final that have already contested an earlier heat.

The first and second horse in each regional race will qualify for the \$500,000 Country Championships final held at Royal Randwick in Sydney on Day 1 of The Championships.

The Provincial Championships consists of a series of five qualifying races worth \$150,000 each, held at each of the Provincial Clubs.

The first, second and third horse in each race will qualify for the \$500,000 Provincial Championships final held at Royal Randwick in Sydney on Day 2 of The Championships.

First there were the Sydney derbies at Homebush, and then at Randwick the Randwick Derby Stakes, Australia Derby Stakes, Derby and Australian Derby– all essentially the same type of race and all conducted by the Australian Jockey Club. Call it what you will, this classic race for three-year-old thoroughbreds has been best known throughout its long history simply as the AJC Derby. For most of the past 150 years when people in New South Wales heard the word derby they said or thought AJC. From its first decade on, the AJC Derby became a popular and prestigious event, not just in racing but also in the social calendar. When spring and in later years autumn came, so too did carnival time at Royal Randwick. It was time to dress up and let your hair down; to meet and greet and try your luck; a time above all to watch and cheer the best horses in Australasia competing for high stakes.

When the Australian Jockey Club was formed in 1842, given the background of its founding members, it looked to model itself on the Jockey Club in England. Every self-respecting race club had to stage its own derby, and before long derbies were being run on the club's course at Homebush, the main racetrack in Sydney for almost 20 years. These derbies were conducted without much fanfare. Only in 1860 after the Australian Jockey Club revived racing at the Sandy Course at Randwick did the derby become the Derby. Some say, and it is a view now widely accepted, that the first AJC Derby was run in 1861 and won by a bay colt named Kyogle –which is why, in 2011, the 150th AJC Derby was celebrated.

Over a long stretch of time even classic horse races undergo changes, and not just to their names. From its inception until 1977 the AJC Derby was run in spring, despite a continual concern about young three-year-olds being asked to run

over a mile-and-a-half or 2400 metres. It was another concern, however, that caused the Derby to be changed to the autumn. The Victoria Derby always had the advantage of being a major part of the Melbourne Cup carnival. To save and enhance the AJC Derby the AJC decided to include the classic in its autumn carnival at Easter. This meant that no Derby was run in 1978. The seasonal change in 1979 was timely and led to the AJC Derby re-asserting its ascendancy as the best staying test in the land for three-year-olds.

For some time the ban on participation of geldings was fuelled by a purist ideal and a monetary ambition. The Derby should be confined to the "real things" – colts and fillies – which, having established their credentials by winning the classic test, could go on to be profitable propositions at stud. For such reasons geldings were banned from competing in the AJC Derby from 1932 to 1956 inclusive. Only 21 geldings have won the Derby but they include such champions as Gloaming (1918), Phar Lap (1929), Dulcify (1979), Kingston Town (1980) and Bonecrusher (1986).

The least of the changes to the AJC Derby was its metrification. The switch from 12 furlongs to 2400 metres was inevitable but when the decision was made for Gold Brick's 1972 Derby it was six years after Australia had officially gone metric. Since then Derby contestants have been cheating on their predecessors: they have run only 11.93 furlongs!

Over 150 plus years a race of 2400 metres fought out by the best available young thoroughbreds is sure to create plenty of drama and excitement on and off the track. The history of the AJC Derby is a story of equine and human struggle, failure and triumph.

"There was 80,000 people there and you could have heard a pin drop. It was like a funeral ... my funeral" – that is how jockey Mel Schumacher described the situation at Randwick when he lost the 1961 Derby on protest and was banned for life by the stewards. Riding Blue Era Schumacher was first past the post by a short half-head in a bustling finish. Tommy Hill, rider of Summer Fair, the other horse in the finish, lodged a protest alleging that Schumacher had grabbed his leg for 50 yards and thereby impeded his mount. The head-on camera used that Saturday for the first time at Randwick confirmed what Schumacher thought no one could see. The stewards awarded the race to Summer Fair, relegating Blue Era to second place. Many people considered the life ban was extreme. Schumacher's desperate but unfair bid to win the Derby was not nearly as dangerous as other actions for which jockeys have received only a brief suspension or a mere fine. Mercifully, Schumacher was permitted to ride again within six years.

Another Derby story that almost defies credibility arises from the 1925 race. Manfred lived up to his trainer's pre-race boast that the Victorian colt could "get left half a furlong and still win". Manfred was nearly always a fractious or reluctant beginner and several times had simply refused to take part in a race. The 1925 AJC Derby was almost one of them. Manfred ran towards the outside rail when the barrier strands were released and dug in his hooves. He consented to race only because the clerk of the course startled him into action with a ferocious crack of his stock whip. Even then it took jockey Billy Duncan a fair while to get him to gallop. He had lost 100 yards at the start and was still that distance behind when the rest of the field passed the winning post for the first time. Gradually the 5/2 on favourite made up ground in a slowly-run race, so that with five furlongs still to run he was in fourth place. Duncan

then made his move, but Amounis, who was leading, went with Manfred and they were neck and neck until well into the straight. At the furlong Amounis began to weaken and Petunia flashed up on the outside and looked likely to win. Duncan called on Manfred for a final effort and the talented three-year-old responded to win by one-and-a-quarter lengths.

If the seven seconds of Manfred's delayed start are factored in, the colt actually ran his Derby in 2.28¼ -- 2¼ seconds under the then Australian record for one-and-a-half miles. Cheers rang out, not only for the great colt, but also for his owner, trainer and jockey.

Until Manfred's incredible performance in 1925, no one believed there could be a more exciting Derby than that of the preceding year. It too was won by an excitable colt and wayward beginner. Heroic had beaten champion Gloaming in the Chelmsford Stakes, and it was no surprise that he was sent out as 10/9 favourite for the Derby, despite heavy support for the New Zealander Nigger Minstrel (5/2) and the Victorian Spearfelt (4/1). It was this trio who fought out a memorable finish in the 1924 Derby.

Heroic got away on terms with his six rivals but immediately ran towards the outside fence and then began to lug in. He was last early as rider Hughie Cairns worked to get him to settle. With seven furlongs to run Sir Dighlock had put 20 lengths on the second horse, with Heroic still well back. Many in the crowd doubted that Sir Dighlock could be reeled in. At the four furlongs mark Cairns made his move. Heroic quickly moved into second, dragging the others with him, particularly Nigger Minstrel and Spearfelt. In the straight Sir Dighlock had caved in and the three favoured runners surged to the lead. Nigger Minstrel momentarily headed Heroic and Spearfelt looked certain to

run past both of them. But he could not do it. A crack with the whip from Cairns and Heroic regained a slender lead over Nigger Minstrel. Could he hold on? When the post was reached Heroic on the inside had outstayed Nigger Minstrel by a head with another head to Spearfelt on the outside.

More than 30 Derbies have been won by a half-length or less. The shortest winning margin was in 1948 when Carbon Copy had a nose to spare over Vagabond. They were separated by the photo-finish camera on the first occasion it was used to determine the outcome of an AJC Derby. The judge's decision in favour of Carbon Copy stirred up a controversy as many racegoers believed the camera favoured the outside runner. Vagabond's stablemate Foxzami was only a neck away third.

In the days before the photo-finish camera the judge twice could not decide on a single winner. In 1919 the result was a dead-heat between Artilleryman and Richmond Main; in 1935 the judge could not split Homer and Allunga.

The shortest price winner of the Derby was a very recent occurrence. It's A Dundee, starting at \$1.24 and ridden by James McDonald was far too strong for his rivals on April 13, 2013. This day will also be remembered for Black Caviar's stunning final race win in the T.J. Smith Stakes.

If the Derby was born in 1779 from the whim of some aristocrats at a party in England it has become a boon to lovers of horse racing in Australia. The Earl of Derby and his confreres brought into being a staying race for three-year-old thoroughbreds that has become Australia's own blue riband of the turf as well as a social institution.

## BREEDING RACEHORSES IN NSW

New South Wales is the heart of Australia's thoroughbred breeding industry, with a heavy concentration of studs in the Hunter Valley. In the 2018/19 breeding season there were 197 stallions active in NSW – 34% of the national total, including the very best and most successful. Approximately 16% of these sires are "shuttle" stallions spending most of the year at studs in Europe or the USA and visiting Australia for four months from late August.

These stallions give Australian breeders unrivalled access to the world's best bloodlines, complementing the speed and toughness of Australian-bred horses. In the 2018/19 season 10,614 mares were covered by stallions in NSW – 52% of the national total. NSW also provided 45% of the national foal crop in 2018/19 – a total of 5,839 foals were born in this State.



# BOBS SILVER AND BOBS EXTRA

The Breeder Owner Bonus Scheme (or BOBS) was designed by Racing NSW to reward owners and breeders for racing NSW-bred horses in New South Wales.

The BOBS Silver program, with the additional benefits of BOBS Extra and BOBS Double Up, make the scheme extremely successful and enormously popular, with near \$164 million paid out since the program's inception.

BOBS bonuses are available on every single race in NSW (excluding Group and some Listed races) where bonuses of up to \$20,000 per race could be won by eligible horses.

The scheme is open to horses which are sired by stallions standing at stud in NSW and which have had a stallion nomination fee paid. Owners of the racehorses then

pay a nomination fee. In the 2021 season over \$12m was paid in bonuses when eligible horses won races in NSW.

Owners are able to double the value of their bonus if they choose to take a voucher which they can then use to purchase another BOBS eligible yearling at a participating Sales Company – effectively meaning the bonus payout for a Saturday metropolitan race could be as high as \$32,000 with \$16,000 available for midweek races and \$8,000 for country events.

BOBS Extra is an extension of BOBS Silver, providing the same bonus to horses winning races of 1800 metres and longer from the day the horse turns 4YO until it is retired. BOBS Extra is designed to make distance racing more attractive, competitive and to balance the trend towards breeding for juvenile speed.

# TEAM THOROUGHBRED NSW

### For the love of the horse

Team Thoroughbred NSW is Racing NSW's equine welfare and rehoming division. It was launched as the NSW Thoroughbred Rehabilitation Trust in 2011 before being rebranded as Team Thoroughbred NSW in 2019 with the aim of creating a single destination for all of Racing NSW's equine welfare programs and services.

Its main function is to provide a safety net for retired NSW Thoroughbred racehorses including those which didn't make it to the track. If they don't have a quality home to go to after racing, they can be surrendered to Team Thoroughbred NSW to be cared for, retrained and rehomed. Team Thoroughbred NSW also develops initiatives to promote the Thoroughbred breed and celebrates the success of retired racehorses in their new careers off the track.

### Facilities

Racing NSW has purchased four farms within the state for the purpose of equine welfare:

- Bandanora is a 2600-acre mixed farming property at Capertee which boasts state-of-the-art equestrian facilities including an indoor arena.
  - Bart's Farm (formerly Princes Farm) is a 137-acre property on the picturesque Nepean River on the north-western outskirts of Sydney. It was designed and built by the legendary Bart Cummings. Team Thoroughbred NSW ambassadors Redzel and Happy Clapper are retired to this facility.
  - The Grange is an 80-acre farm at Oxley Island on the Mid North Coast of NSW which was previously used as a boutique Thoroughbred stud farm.
- Glenferrie Farm is a stunning 300-acre property at Roslyn, near Crookwell, which is among the best equestrian properties in the area.
  - Team Thoroughbred NSW also cares for horses in partnership with other organisations:
    - Minimum security inmates at St Heliers Correctional Centre in Muswellbrook learn to re-educate retired racehorses for their next pursuit off the track as part of their rehabilitation for return to society.
    - Former jockey and competitive equestrian Cassie Schmidt retrains a small number of Thoroughbreds at her property, Bud Regal Park at Redbank NSW.
    - Australian representative polo player Alec White and his father Anto retrain Thoroughbreds at their property at Belltrees, near Scone.

## Retired Racehorse Inspections

Racing NSW has appointed two dedicated equine welfare veterinarians to monitor retired racehorses in their new homes. Each day Racing Australia updates its database of retired racehorses including their new location and person responsible for their welfare, as required under the Rules of Racing. Racing NSW stewards, investigators and welfare veterinarians work through this list to conduct welfare checks on these horses.

Every inspection includes:

- A microchip scan
- A basic examination of the horse
- An assessment of its surroundings
- An opportunity to seek advice or guidance from Racing NSW's equine welfare veterinarians

The stewards, investigators or veterinarians will talk to the new owner about their plans for the horse and address any queries or concerns either party has.

## End Of Life Welfare

When a veterinarian has advised euthanasia is necessary on welfare grounds, the procedure should be carried out in a humane and timely manner. Racing NSW has introduced the End Of Life Welfare Program to ensure suffering is not prolonged due to the cost of humane euthanasia. Under the program, every Thoroughbred which has been predominantly domiciled in New South Wales will have access to free, humane euthanasia if required at any point in his or her life.

Euthanasia under the End Of Life Welfare Program is only permitted when a Racing NSW licensed veterinarian has certified that it is necessary on genuine welfare or safety reasons in the best interests of the horse. As part of this free service,

Racing NSW will also cover the cost of burial. Under no circumstances should a Thoroughbred ever be sent to a knackery or slaughterhouse.

Racing industry participants directly contribute to the aftercare of NSW racehorses through the Equine Welfare Fund. 1% of all prizemoney allocated to NSW Thoroughbred racing is withheld and directed into the fund which is managed by a board of trustees. # The Golden Slipper – March

Group 1, 1200m, Rosehill, 2YO Set Weights

### Race History

The Golden Slipper, a pinnacle of the Sydney Autumn Carnival, is the richest 2YO race in the world with prize money of \$5m.

First run in 1957, the 1200m Group 1 event has been shaping careers since its first running. Todman, the horse to win the first running of the Golden Slipper went on to sire 30 individual stakes winners in an illustrious career at stud.

The Golden Slipper is the first leg of the 2yo Triple Crown which features the Sires' Produce Stakes and the Champagne Stakes, with the last horses to win all three races being Pierro 2012 and Dance Hero in 2004 both trained by Gai Waterhouse.

### Horses

Many Slipper winners have gone on to be success stories at stud including: Stratum, Seabring, Flying Spur, Catbird, Danzero, Star Watch, Marauding, Rory's Jester, Marscay, Canny Lad, Sir Dapper, Luskin Star, Vain, Pago Pago, with Pierro recently retiring to stud.

Fillies that have won the race & have gone on to win multiple stakes races include: Forensics, Miss Finland, Ha Ha, Belle Du Jour, Merlene, Burst, Bounding Away, Toy Show & Storm Queen.

Todman sired two winners of the Slipper: Eskimo Prince (1964) and Sweet Embrace (1967). Flying Spur sired Forensics (2007), Danzero sired Dance Hero (2004) and Marscay sired Bint Marscay (1993).

The George Ryder Stakes has been a good guide to recent Doncaster winners with Vision And Power (2009), Haradasun (2007) and Racing To Win (2006) winning the George Ryder/Doncaster Stakes double.

### Horses

In 2014, the race was won by visiting Irish horse Gordon Lord Byron. Notable horses to have won the George Ryder Stakes twice are: Lonhro (2004, 2003), Campaign King (1988, 1987), Emancipation (1984, 1983), Manikato (1980, 1979), Foresight (1969, 1968), Time And Tide (1967, 1964) & Prince Regoli (1963, 1962). ## Race History

The Doncaster Mile is the World's richest mile race worth \$3m and has long been acknowledged as Australia's mile Championship.

First run in 1866, the 1600m Group 1 event has produced 9 horses that have gone on to win it twice, including in recent times Sacred Fall (NZ) in 2013 & 2014.

In 2010 trainer Gai Waterhouse took controversial Supreme Court action before the Doncaster, claiming stable jockey Nash Rawiller should be ordered to ride Theseo. Rawiller had taken the mount on Rangirangdoo after Waterhouse had suggested Theseo would not be a runner. The Supreme Court upheld the Racing NSW stewards' decision that Rawiller could ride Rangirangdoo, which went on to win the Doncaster, while Theseo, under Darren Beadman, finished 8th.

## Horses

Many Doncaster winners have gone on and won multiple stakes races.

#### Race History

First run in 1997, the T.J Smith has produced some very smart horses in its short history, now forming part of The Championships prize money is \$2.5 million. No colt has gone on to win the race, yet colts who have gone on to stud careers have placed in the race 7 times: Northern Meteor (2nd, 2009), Snitzel (3rd, 6), Fastnet Rock (2nd, 2005), Bel Esprit (3rd, 2003), Falvelon (3rd, 2001), Easy Rocking (2nd, 2000) & Clang (3rd, 1997).

#### Horses

In 2013 Black Caviar won her second T J Smith Stakes in what was to be her final race. Rated the best racehorse in the world, her wins at Randwick have been two of her best. In 2011 she ran down Hay List and then in 2013 she returned to the 'new' Royal Randwick and blitzed a strong field thrilling a sell out crowd. Takeover Target, another sprinting champion also won the event in 2009.

#### Trainers

It is quite fitting that Gai Waterhouse is the leading trainer of the race named in honour of her father. Gai has trained 3 winners: Bentley Biscuit (2007), Shamekha (2005) & Phoenix Park (2002).

#### Jockeys

There are only four jockeys to have won more than one T.J Smith, Nash Rawiller who has won the race twice aboard: Takeover Target (2009) & Bentley Biscuit (2007, Luke Nolen with his two wins aboard Black Caviar (2011 & 2013) and Tommy Berry with Chautauqua (2015-2016).

### Race History

First run in 1861, the Australian Derby is a feature race of The Championships and is worth \$2 million. The Australian Derby is the final leg in the Triple Crown series which featured the Randwick Guineas as the first leg and the Rosehill Guineas as the second leg.

### Horses

Notable winner of the Australian Derby include: It's A Dundeel (2013), Shoot Out (2010), Eremein (2005), Starcraft (2004), Universal Prince (2001), Sky Heights (1999), Octagonal (1996), Mahogany (1994), Naturalism (1992), Research (1989), Beau Zam (1988), Bonecrusher (1986), Tristarc (1985), Strawberry Road (1983), Rose Of Kingston (1982), Kingston Town (1980), Dulcify (1979), Tulloch (1957), Phar Lap (1929) & Gloaming (1918).

The race is typically dominated by colts, with the last filly to take the race being Shamrock in 2011.

Among winning colts who have gone on to be successful stallions are Starcraft (2004), Clangalang (2003), Don Eduardo (2002), Universal Prince (2001), Octagonal (1996), Naturalism (1992), Durbridge (1991), Beau Zam (1988), Strawberry Road (1983), Our Paddy Boy (1981) & Royal Sovereign (1964).

Until 1978 the Derby was held in the spring and 34 horses completed the AJC Derby/VRC Derby double. Since the AJC Derby was switched to the autumn only Dulcify and Mahogany have achieved that feat, while Kingston Town and Our Paddy Boy (1981) have gone on to win the Sydney Cup at their next start. Four horses have completed the Spring Champion Stakes/Derby Double, the most recent being Universal Prince (2000-01). Hall Mark in 1933 is the last Derby winner to go on to victory in the Melbourne Cup.

In 2010 there was a remarkable result as the first three placegetters (Shoot Out, Descarado and Monaco Consul) were all sired by the same stallion, High Chaparral.

### THE BARB

A black horse foaled in 1863 at Kelso near Bathurst, The Barb was one of the early champions of the turf in NSW. He was sold as a yearling for 200 guineas to prominent owner John Tait and appeared for his first race on Easter Monday 1866 at the Homebush track. He bucked his rider off, then after being remounted missed the start.

The Barb went on to win 16 of his 21 races, including the AJC Derby, Sydney Cup twice, Queen's Plate, Craven Plate, Great Metropolitan Handicap, Randwick Plate and in 1866 the Melbourne Cup.

Sold as a stallion for a then record price of 2000 pounds, The Barb had only mediocre results as a sire.
